General Manager Report

Dear Residents,

Welcome to the March edition of the Breakfast Pointer! In the last issue, we had an abundance of content, so I didn't provide my usual report. Firstly, I hope you all had a wonderful Christmas and a Happy New Year, and we're looking forward to a great year ahead. Thank you to all the residents who supported the Country Club over the summer. The Club was extremely busy leading up to Christmas and throughout the holiday period and we have received significant support and attendance at the poolside kiosk and various member events. Your support has been greatly appreciated.

I am excited about the year ahead with our new cafe manager starting this month (the role has been vacant since October), which will allow me to focus on the more strategic aspects of my role. In February, we launched our new asset management software, enabling the team to maintain our asset register, track asset conditions, raise work orders, and eventually have historic data of works and costs associated with each asset. The software has also streamlined several processes for our staff and contractors.

The delivery of our capital works program is underway with the planned renewal of the playing surface of tennis courts 2 & 3, new carpet for the Country Club, and re-surfacing of the lagoon pool. The facility management contract has gone out to tender, and the landscape gardening contract will go to tender in April/May in

preparation for the end of the current 4-year contract in November 2024.

Keeping the Pool Area Clean

It has been such a great success having the Kiosk open on weekends during the summer months. Many pool goers have expressed their thanks for the opportunity to purchase food and beverages without having to get changed into appropriate gear and trek upstairs. We ask that everyone picks up their own rubbish when they are leaving and dispose in the bins that are positioned on the bottom floor. One bin is close to the exit door. This allows the staff to manage their time much better and improve service to us all.

Magnolia Street Traffic Management

The suggestion to incorporate a safer crossing area at Magnolia Street and Market Street is still being explored. Current suggestions range from a crossing, pedestrian refuge, speed calmers and/or possible road changes including the narrowing of Magnolia or a one-way section at the Market St exit. Cost of works could be as high as \$150k for the first two options, once ancillary works are included. Despite assertions by some residents that BP roads are private and that we can do whatever we like, our collective view is that we are ultimately governed by NSW road law. We are also part of a local Council set up with their own review and approval frameworks on road matters so we should comply with the standards of CBC. The strategy now is to work closely with Council each step of the way to review the issues and assess our options as we present findings to the Community. This is a work in progress and the Community will be kept informed.




Change of Date

Traffic Management

The AC had a presentation from the Peninsulas Action Group (PAG) representing Mortlake, Cabarita and Breakfast Point areas. Their concern is that the new development in this area needs to be aligned with a new traffic management plan for the area. There are a number of hotspots, particularly in the Mortlake area, that is an "accident black spot". With the upcoming Council elections in 2024, residents may need to ask the question, "What is the traffic management plan in this area for 2024/2025?'

Visitor Parking Overstays

The issue of visitor parking overstays plus regular unsightly presence of boats & trailers is a contentious issue. There are legal complications in trying to force removals in a timely manner. Council and Police need the owners' details before they can take any action. There is always a need to check the Development Approval (DA) where incident is on a strata designated spot. We are able to prevent use of chains and wheel locks to secure long-term and remove any attachment to trees etc after 7 days notice. This will be enforced.

Robert Rose AM

Written for the Rose Family by a former Rose employee and alumnus.

Robert Rose AM, Bob to those who knew him, worked with him, conducted business with him and designed, built, and landscaped for him.

Bob is a direct descendant of Thomas Rose who was one of the first free settlers in Australia, arriving in Sydney on the Bellona on 16 January 1793. (If the name of that ship sounds familiar Bellona in the Harbour precinct at Breakfast Point was named after her.) Thomas and his wife Jane along with



their three sons and one daughter settled on 32 hectares of land in an area they called Liberty Plains, now forming part of modernday Strathfield, Homebush and Lidcombe. Who could have foreseen at that time, 231 years ago, that Thomas and Jane had set their family on the path that would see one of their descendants return to a place, just a short horse and dray ride from that original landholding, to establish first Cape Cabarita and then Breakfast Point.

Born from their own experiences in creating homes that they were proud to call their own, Rosecorp's vision was and remains to create homes and places that put family first. Communities, homes, places, and spaces that Bob and his family are proud to lend their name to.

In the mid-1990's Bob took on the considerable challenge of adapting a former pharmaceutical factory in Cabarita into a new unit complex. Bob did not like that phrase "unit complex" and his creative approach to the unique peninsula site gave rise to one of his mantras that "sometimes less is more." Bob and the Rosecorp team designed Cape Cabarita to establish a new standard of residential community in Sydney's Inner West.

Luxury apartment buildings centrally located overlooking large, beautifully crafted gardens, open spaces and resident amenities surrounded by waterfront town houses. Thoughtful touches such as the potting shed became hallmarks of Bob's desire to create places where people would make their own family homes, engage with their neighbours and create thriving communities. To the surprise of many and living up to the belief that less is more, Bob removed the last apartment buildings from

the master plan and replaced them with a neighbourhood of luxury, freestanding houses, some with water or golf course views.

With the above coming into fruition Bob and Margaret's company was growing, an in-house design team, development and project managers, marketers and sales people. Their two sons Bryan and Stuart came on board at this point for the delivery of Cape Cabarita and to help with the opportunity just around the corner.

A 52 hectare site, bigger than his forefathers first lands at Liberty Plains, was quite literally on Bobs doorstep. The former AGL site at Breakfast Point. Bob wasn't really serious about it, just toying with the idea, dreaming big so to speak. Until the mayor of the former Concord City Council urged Bob to talk to AGL. The authenticity with which Bob had worked with Council during the planning and development of Cape Cabarita had given the mayor confidence that Bob was genuine and would create something not seen in Sydney before.



Bob's ecosystem of trusted consultants, planners, architects, engineers, financiers, and of course his family and team at Rosecorp collaborated to formulate an offer and development concept that brought AGL to the table, and the rest as they say is history.

Bob's authentic approach to development, and his belief in community ensured that over the 20 years of continual development at Breakfast Point, the design and aesthetic concept never changed. If one is not a seasoned Breakfast Pointer, upon driving through the village it is hard to discern what was the first building built and what was the last.



The first decade of the new century held much in store for Bob. Around the same time that he was establishing Breakfast Point, Bob was establishing the Urban



Taskforce with a group of like-minded developers and property professionals dedicated to improving the urban fabric of our towns and cities. Bob was the Chair of the Urban Taskforce from 2003 to 2009, and in 2008 he was appointed as a Member of the Order of Australia for his contributions to the industry and the community in the area of sustainable urban development, and for his support of a range of charitable organisations.

In 2005 Bob and his family received perhaps the greatest confirmation of their authentic approach to development by the visit of His Majesty King Charles III (then The Prince of Wales) to Breakfast Point in his capacity as the patron of the International Network for Traditional Building Architecture and Urbanism (INTBAU), which is a global network dedicated to creating better places to live.



Most recently, Bob and his sons Bryan and Stuart have redeveloped the former Salvation Army Respite Home in Dee Why. Staying true to Bob and Margaret's affinity for heritage coastal architecture, the 126 apartments of Hamptons by Rose is now under construction and will welcome her first residents in 2025.

All that being said, of all that Bob has achieved, designed, master-planned, founded and established, the most important legacy for him is his family. His wife and partner Margaret Rose AM, their children, and the next generation of nine grandchildren were the centre of his life. Bob is also remembered by those whose careers he has positively affected, an alumnus of people who continue his legacy, his approach to development within his company, throughout the development industry in Australia and around the world. And Bob is remembered in perpetuity in the places he has envisaged, crafted, and created.
